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Invesco USD Reserve Fund:

Change of fund name, investment objective, investment manager & investment sub-manager and change of fund managers with effect from 06 December 2018

With effect from 06 December 2018, the Invesco USD Reserve Fund will be re-named Invesco USD Ultra-Short Term Debt Fund and the fund's investment objective will change. At the same time, the investment manager and investment submanager will change. Furthermore, Laurie Brignac, Joseph Madrid and Marques Mercier will be added as named fund managers.

The re-positioning will seek to move the fund further along the yield curve as a differentiated liquidity solution to money market funds.

The move to the ultra-short bond space will loosen restrictions around both initial and residual maturity, which will allow the investment managers to implement the desired strategy more effectively.

With a view to transitioning management to the US team, Laurie Brignac, Joseph Madrid and Marques Mercier will take over primary management while Paul Mueller will focus on other projects at Invesco.

There will be no change to the philosophy or investment process of the fund because of this change.

Biographies:

Laurie Brignac:

Laurie is Head of Global Liquidity Portfolio
Management for Invesco Fixed Income, and is
responsible for providing senior management
oversight of liquidity products in the US, EMEA
(Europe, Middle East and Africa) and Asia Pacific
regions. Laurie has been in the investment business
since 1989. She joined Invesco in 1992 as a money
market trader, and was promoted to investment
officer in 1994 and senior portfolio manager in 2002.

Her duties have expanded to include all forms of short-term fixed income products, including money market and short-duration products. Laurie has served as a member of the Tri-Party Repo Infrastructure Reform Task Force and participates in various industry committees, both in the US and globally. Prior to joining Invesco, she was a sales assistant for HSBC Securities Inc. Laurie began her career as a money market trader responsible for managing the Federal Reserve position at Premier Bank in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. She earned a BS degree in accounting from Louisiana State University. Laurie is a Chartered Financial Analyst® (CFA) charterholder and holds the Series 7, 63 and 79 registrations.

Joesph Madrid:

Joseph is a Head of Credit Portfolio Manager for Invesco Fixed Income. He is responsible for contributing to the strategy and management of cash management products, including institutional, retail and offshore funds, as well as private accounts and ultra-short bond portfolios. Joseph began his investment career in 2002 as a financial analyst with J.P. Morgan Chase & Co. Prior to joining Invesco, he was a portfolio manager in client service and a senior fixed income securities analyst with National City Corp. Joseph joined Invesco in 2009 and was previously a fixed income analyst responsible for providing investment research, credit analysis and portfolio management support for cash management products. He earned a BA degree in accounting from Baldwin-Wallace College and an MBA from the University of New Mexico. Joseph is a Chartered Financial Analyst® (CFA) charterholder.

Marques Mercier:

Marques is a Senior Portfolio Manager and Head of Government Funds in Global Liquidity for Invesco Fixed Income. He is responsible for the management

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of all cash management products, including institutional, retail and offshore money funds, as well as private accounts. Marques joined Invesco in 1994 as a representative in the transfer agency. In 1996, he was promoted to portfolio administrator for money

market funds, and he became a portfolio manager in 1998. Marques earned a BA degree in English and an MBA from the University of Houston.

Investment objective (excerpts) The Fund aims to provide maximum return with a high degree of security from a portfolio of short-dated fixed interest securities denominated in USD which have an initial or residual maturity not exceeding 12 months. The assets of the Fund may also comprise floating rate debt securities and debt securities with a maturity exceeding 12 months, provided, as a result of the terms of issue or by the use of adequate instruments or techniques, the rate of interest thereof is adjusted at least once annually in the light of market conditions. The portfolio of the Fund may include cash and cash equivalents.	The Fund seeks to achieve a gross return in excess of 3-month USD LIBOR. The Fund seeks to achieve its objective by investing in debt securities and cash. Debt securities may include government debt securities, fixed and floating rate corporate debt securities, ABS, Money Market Instruments and cash equivalents. The Fund will invest at least 70% of its NAV in debt securities denominated in USD. The Fund may invest up to 20% of its NAV in ABS. Such securities will have a minimum credit rating of AAA at the time of purchase. The average portfolio duration will not exceed 12 months. For the purposes of the Fund, debt securities will not have a residual maturity exceeding 3 years at the time of purchase. The fund may invest up to 5% of its NAV in non-investment grade debt securities and will not invest in securities with a credit rating of below B- by Standard and Poor's rating agency, or equivalent (or in the case of unrated debt securities, determined to be of an equivalent rating). The Fund may invest, for efficient portfolio management and hedging purposes only, in derivatives on credit, rates and currencies. Non-USD investments are intended to be hedged back into USD on a discretionary basis.
